Braided Rug Repair with Pam Rowan

Things That You Need to Know... That the Customer Might Not Be Able to Answer.

1	Is the rug butted or continuous?
2	Is it braided with the openings to the left, to the right, or is it plaited?
3	Is it made with wool <i>cloth</i> or with wool <i>yarn</i> ?
4	Is it laced every loop, or every other loop, or hand-sewn on the back of the rug?
5	You will be able to tell if it's moth damage or wear and tear.
	If it is moth damage then you'll need to treat it and wash it.
6	Do you have the colors of wool needed to repair this rug?
7	Is it a hit or miss pattern, or specific colors?
8	What is it laced with? Do you have the lacing thread and all the lacing needles?
9	After inspecting the rug and knowing what the time expectations are, you might be able to
	give them a reality time line.
10	As Nancy Young said in her article: you don't realize how much longer it takes to repair a rug than
	it does to make a rug! So it's difficult to give an estimate per square foot like you can
	when making a rug.
11	What might seem to you to be a rug that is not worthy or worth repairing because it is way

too damaged... might just be the sentimental rug they can't let go of yet.
